

## 99TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY State of Illinois 2015 and 2016 HB3527

## SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

105 ILCS 75/10 105 ILCS 75/15

Amends the Right to Privacy in the School Setting Act. In provisions allowing a school to request or require a student (or, in addition, his or her parent or guardian with respect to post-secondary schools) to provide a password or other related account information in order to gain access to the student's account or profile on a social networking website (or, in addition, to demand access with respect to post-secondary schools) if the school has reasonable cause to believe that the student's account on a social networking website contains evidence that the student has violated a school disciplinary rule or policy, provides that a school does not have reasonable cause unless a victim or concerned party, such as a parent or guardian, has filed a complaint with the school or school personnel have observed cyber-bullying taking place. Effective immediately.

## Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

- 4 Section 5. The Right to Privacy in the School Setting Act
- is amended by changing Sections 10 and 15 as follows:
- 6 (105 ILCS 75/10)
- 7 Sec. 10. Prohibited inquiry.
- 8 (a) It is unlawful for a post-secondary school to request 9 or require a student or his or her parent or quardian to
- 10 provide a password or other related account information in
- order to gain access to the student's account or profile on a
- 12 social networking website or to demand access in any manner to
- a student's account or profile on a social networking website.
- 14 (b) Nothing in this Section limits a post-secondary
  15 school's right to do the following:
- 16 (1) promulgate and maintain lawful school policies
- governing the use of the post-secondary school's
- 18 electronic equipment, including policies regarding
- 19 Internet use, social networking website use, and
- 20 electronic mail use; and
- 21 (2) monitor usage of the post-secondary school's
- 22 electronic equipment and the post-secondary school's
- electronic mail without requesting or requiring a student

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- to provide a password or other related account information in order to gain access to the student's account or profile on a social networking website.
  - (c) Nothing in this Section prohibits a post-secondary school from obtaining information about a student that is in the public domain or that is otherwise obtained in compliance with this Act.
- 8 (d) This Section does not apply when a post-secondary 9 school has reasonable cause to believe that a student's account 10 on a social networking website contains evidence that the 11 student has violated a school disciplinary rule or policy. A 12 post-secondary school does not have reasonable cause unless a victim or concerned party, such as a parent or guardian, has 13 filed a complaint with the school or school personnel have 14 15 observed cyber-bullying taking place.

- 17 (105 ILCS 75/15)
  - Sec. 15. Notification. An elementary or secondary school must provide notification to the student and his or her parent or guardian that the elementary or secondary school may request or require a student to provide a password or other related account information in order to gain access to the student's account or profile on a social networking website if the elementary or secondary school has reasonable cause to believe that the student's account on a social networking website

- 1 contains evidence that the student has violated a school
- disciplinary rule or policy. An elementary or secondary school
- 3 does not have reasonable cause unless a victim or concerned
- 4 party, such as a parent or guardian, has filed a complaint with
- 5 the school or school personnel have observed cyber-bullying
- 6 taking place. The notification must be published in the
- 7 elementary or secondary school's disciplinary rules, policies,
- 8 or handbook or communicated by similar means.
