1 AN ACT concerning appropriations.

2 **Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented**
3 **in the General Assembly:**

4 ARTICLE 1

5 Section 1. The following named amounts, or so much
6 thereof as may be necessary, respectively, for the objects
7 and purposes hereinafter named, are appropriated to meet the
8 ordinary and contingent expenses of the Illinois Racing
9 Board:

12 Section 5. The sum of \$185,000, or so much thereof as
 13 may be necessary, is appropriated from the Horse Racing Fund
 14 to the Illinois Racing Board for costs and expenses related
 15 to or in support of a Government Services Shared Services
 16 Center.

17 Section 99. Effective date. This Act takes effect July
 18 1, 2016, if and only if Senate Bill 2789 of the 99th General
 19 Assembly (the Unbalanced Budget Response Act), as introduced
 20 in the Illinois Senate, becomes law.
