AN ACT concerning education.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, 2 represented in the General Assembly: 3

Section 5. The School Code is amended by changing Section 4 5 2-3.64a-5 as follows:

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(105 ILCS 5/2-3.64a-5)

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Sec. 2-3.64a-5. State goals and assessment.

8 (a) For the the assessment and accountability purposes of 9 this Section, "students" includes those students enrolled in a public or State-operated elementary school, secondary school, 10 11 or cooperative or joint agreement with a governing body or board of control, a charter school operating in compliance with 12 the Charter Schools Law, a school operated by a regional office 13 14 of education under Section 13A-3 of this Code, or a public school administered by a local public agency or the Department 15 16 of Human Services.

17 The State Board of Education shall establish the (b) academic standards that are to be applicable to students who 18 19 are subject to State assessments under this Section. The State 20 Board of Education shall not establish any such standards in 21 final form without first providing opportunities for public 22 participation and local input in the development of the final Those opportunities shall include a 23 academic standards.

3 (c) Beginning no later than the 2014-2015 school year, the 4 State Board of Education shall annually assess all students 5 enrolled in grades 3 through 8 in English language arts and 6 mathematics.

7 Beginning no later than the 2017-2018 school year, the 8 State Board of Education shall annually assess all students in 9 science at one grade in grades 3 through 5, at one grade in 10 grades 6 through 8, and at one grade in grades 9 through 12.

11 The State Board of Education shall annually assess schools 12 that operate a secondary education program, as defined in Section 22-22 of this Code, in English language arts and 13 mathematics. The State Board of Education shall administer no 14 more than 3 assessments, per student, of English language arts 15 16 and mathematics for students in a secondary education program. 17 One of these assessments shall include a college and career ready determination. 18

19 Students who are not assessed for college and career ready 20 determinations may not receive a regular high school diploma 21 unless the student is exempted from taking State assessments 22 under subsection (d) of this Section because (i) the student's 23 individualized educational program developed under Article 14 24 of this Code identifies the State assessment as inappropriate 25 for the student, (ii) the student is enrolled in a program of adult and continuing education, as defined in the Adult 26

Education Act, (iii) the school district is not required to 1 2 assess the individual student for purposes of accountability under federal No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 requirements, 3 (iv) the student has been determined to be an English language 4 5 learner, referred to in this Code as a student with limited English proficiency, and has been enrolled in schools in the 6 7 United States for less than 12 months, or (v) the student is 8 otherwise identified by the State Board of Education, through 9 rules, as being exempt from the assessment.

10 The State Board of Education shall not assess students 11 under this Section in subjects not required by this Section.

Districts shall inform their students of the timelines and procedures applicable to their participation in every yearly administration of the State assessments. The State Board of Education shall establish periods of time in each school year during which State assessments shall occur to meet the objectives of this Section.

(d) Every individualized educational program as described 18 in Article 14 shall identify if the State assessment or 19 20 components thereof are appropriate for the student. The State 21 Board of Education shall develop rules governing the 22 administration of an alternate assessment that may be available 23 to students for whom participation in this State's regular 24 assessments is not appropriate, even with accommodations as 25 allowed under this Section.

26 Students receiving special education services whose

individualized educational programs identify them as eligible for the alternative State assessments nevertheless shall have the option of taking this State's regular assessment that includes a college and career ready determination, which shall be administered in accordance with the eligible accommodations appropriate for meeting these students' respective needs.

7 All students determined to be an English language learner, referred to in this Code as a student with limited English 8 9 proficiency, shall participate in the State assessments, 10 excepting those students who have been enrolled in schools in 11 the United States for less than 12 months. Such students may be 12 exempted from participation in one annual administration of the 13 English language arts assessment. Any student determined to be 14 an English language learner, referred to in this Code as a 15 student with limited English proficiency, shall receive 16 appropriate assessment accommodations, including language 17 supports, which shall be established by rule. Approved assessment accommodations must be provided until the student's 18 19 English language skills develop to the extent that the student 20 is no longer considered to be an English language learner, 21 referred to in this Code as a student with limited English 22 proficiency, as demonstrated through a State-identified 23 English language proficiency assessment.

(e) The results or scores of each assessment taken under
this Section shall be made available to the parents of each
student.

In each school year, the scores attained by a student on 1 2 the State assessment that includes a college and career ready determination must be placed in the student's permanent record 3 and must be entered on the student's transcript pursuant to 4 5 rules that the State Board of Education shall adopt for that purpose in accordance with Section 3 of the Illinois School 6 7 Student Records Act. In each school year, the scores attained 8 by a student on the State assessments administered in grades 3 9 through 8 must be placed in the student's temporary record.

10 (f) All schools shall administer an academic assessment of 11 English language proficiency in oral language (listening and 12 speaking) and reading and writing skills to all children 13 determined to be English language learners, referred to in 14 Section 14C-3 of this Code as children with limited 15 English-speaking ability.

16 (g) All schools in this State that are part of the sample 17 drawn by the National Center for Education Statistics, in collaboration with their school districts and the State Board 18 19 of Education, shall administer the biennial academic 20 assessments under the National Assessment of Educational Progress carried out under Section 411(b)(2) of the federal 21 22 National Education Statistics Act of 1994 (20 U.S.C. 9010) if 23 the U.S. Secretary of Education pays the costs of administering 24 the assessments.

(h) Subject to available funds to this State for thepurpose of student assessment, the State Board of Education

1 shall provide additional assessments and assessment resources 2 that may be used by school districts for local assessment 3 purposes. The State Board of Education shall annually 4 distribute a listing of these additional resources.

5 (i) For the purposes of this subsection (i), "academically 6 based assessments" means assessments consisting of questions and answers that are measurable and quantifiable to measure the 7 8 knowledge, skills, and ability of students in the subject 9 covered by the assessments. A11 matters assessments 10 administered pursuant to this Section must be academically 11 based assessments. The scoring of academically based 12 assessments shall be reliable, valid, and fair and shall meet the quidelines for assessment development and use prescribed by 13 14 the American Psychological Association, the National Council on Measurement in Education, and the American Educational 15 16 Research Association.

The State Board of Education shall review the use of all assessment item types in order to ensure that they are valid and reliable indicators of student performance aligned to the learning standards being assessed and that the development, administration, and scoring of these item types are justifiable in terms of cost.

(j) The State Superintendent of Education shall appoint a
 committee of no more than 21 members, consisting of parents,
 teachers, school administrators, school board members,
 assessment experts, regional superintendents of schools, and

citizens, to review the State assessments administered by the 1 2 State Board of Education. The Committee shall select one of its 3 members as its chairperson. The Committee shall meet on an ongoing basis to review the content and design of the 4 5 assessments (including whether the requirements of subsection 6 (i) of this Section have been met), the time and money expended at the local and State levels to prepare for and administer the 7 assessments, the collective results of the assessments as 8 9 measured against the stated purpose of assessing student 10 performance, and other issues involving the assessments 11 identified by the Committee. The Committee shall make periodic 12 recommendations to the State Superintendent of Education and 13 the General Assembly concerning the assessments.

14 (k) The State Board of Education may adopt rules to 15 implement this Section.
