- Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, 2

- 4 Section 5. The Emergency Telephone System Act is

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- Sec. 15.6. Enhanced 9-1-1 service; business service. 7
- 8 (a) After June 30, 2000, or within 18 months after
- enhanced 9-1-1 service becomes available, any entity that 9

- businesses shall assure that the system is connected to the 12
