WHEREAS, Lupus is a chronic, incurable autoimmune disease of unknown origin that mainly affects women of childbearing age, is difficult to diagnose and causes severe, potentially life-threatening organ damage; and

WHEREAS, The Lupus Foundation of America estimates that 1.4 million people in the U.S. have a form of lupus; and

WHEREAS, Lupus causes the immune system to attack the body's healthy cells and tissues producing skin damage, rheumatoid arthritis, life-threatening inflammation of multiple major organs, and a potentially fatal failure of the renal, circulatory or central nervous systems; and

WHEREAS, Symptoms include joint pain, rash, unusual loss of hair, unexplained fever, low blood counts, sensitivity to the sun and fingers that turn pale or purple when exposed to cold; and

WHEREAS, According to the Lupus Foundation of America, a survey of its members revealed that more than half of all people with lupus suffered four or more years and were examined by three or more doctors before obtaining a correct diagnosis; and

WHEREAS, According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, the number of lupus-related deaths between 1979 and 1988 increased dramatically; African American women, ages 45-64, experienced a 70 percent increase, the largest increase among all groups in the twenty years studied; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the Director of the Illinois Department of Public Health to implement a public education and outreach program
to raise awareness about the symptoms and potentially life-threatening effects of the disease lupus; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be presented to the Director of the Illinois Department of Public Health.
