In accordance with the Unified Code of Corrections, Director Rob Jeffreys respectfully submits the following data regarding the award of sentence credit for good conduct, or also known as “Supplemental Sentence Credit” to the General Assembly. This sentence credit of up to 180 days was awarded at the discretion of the Department to eligible individuals in custody pursuant to Section 3-6-3(a)(3) of the Code of Corrections.

For the time period represented in this report; October 1, 2022 through September 30, 2023; there were 0 individuals in custody that exited with an average of 0.0 days of supplemental sentence credits due to both individuals having their supplemental sentence credits awarded and revoked.

Sec. 3-6-3. Rules and Regulations for Sentence Credit.

(3.5) The Department shall provide annual written reports to the Governor and the General Assembly on the award of sentence credit for good conduct, with the first report due January 1, 2014. The Department must publish both reports on its website within 48 hours of transmitting the reports to the Governor and the General Assembly. The reports must include:

- (A) the number of individuals awarded sentence credit for good conduct;
- (B) the average amount of sentence credit for good conduct awarded;
- (C) the holding offenses of individuals in custody awarded sentence credit for good conduct; and
- (D) the number of sentence credit for good conduct revocations.
